Hello All, Welcome to the September Edition of the Tokara newsletter. This issue is all about our gauntlet of performances from August 1st to the 26th during the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. Needless to say we had a blast. Whether it was our daily treks to the show, or our excursions to the Royal Mile on High Street to perform on the outdoor stage (literally drumming on the stage because of the noise complaints coming from all the other

Next, "Wild Child" Yukari Ichise. Her favorite moment... the first day when we found out that we only had five minutes for setup and take down of our set. For those of you who know anything about taiko drum shows, this would seem like an impossible task. However,

There are obviously a number of stories that accumulated along the way, though to keep this from becoming a novel, I will grab one favorite story from each one of us to give you a little more of a sense of what our time at the Fringe was like.

We start off with our leader, teacher and artistic director, Art Lee. His favorite moment from the festival was the little boy from Singapore who was so excited during the show, he could not help but spontaneously express his joy at the top of his lungs while Art Sensei was talking between pieces. This resulted in the two of them having their own little conversations with each other about how the show was progressing, much to the delight of the rest of the audience. Oh, and if you have ever been to one of our

after an initial moment of disbelief, all of the members pulled together and raced through the setup and take down of the set with barely a spoken word, speeding from one task to the next, making the allotted time on the first day to the amazement of the stage crew at the venue. For Yukarisan, thinking back on that moment she could feel the harmony of dedication and trust between the performers that appeared as if from instinct.

Takafumi-san's favorite moment occurred a few times during our performances. It came right at the

people max on three sides of a thrust stage. And once all of our equipment is in place, there is a meter and a half at best between the closest drum to the first row. The room itself is a box shape, with no windows and two exits. When that first big "Don" comes, there is not a lot of options for those sound waves to travel except through the members of the audience. So, on occasion this sudden blast of sound would startle some in the audience, resulting in a little jump out of their seats.

Although unfortunate, everything in the bag was replaceable with the exception of a couple of personal mementos and one extremely important
